The documentary of AVVA President Cang Dong's life as a Former Special Forces Ranger of the Armed Forces, Republic of Vietnam. President Cang Dong was one of the good guys working with the United States Vietnam Soldiers. Moreover, President Cang Dong was captured by the North Vietnamese and held as a POW for ten-years!! I do not have many details regarding President Cang Dong's biography; however, more details will be forthcoming in the next report.

Storyteller of 'Cut on The Action,' is designing the documentary of AVVA President Cang Dong's life in Vietnam from pre-production, production and to post-production. 'Cut On The Action' also has an airmobile production package and films worldwide. 'Cut On The Action' is headquartered in the San Francisco Bay Area, with production partners in LA, New York, San Diego, and Kansas City.

CA STATE COUNCIL MEETING AVVA AND VVA met in Visalia June 9th-11th. AVVA members Margie Young, Kelly Frederickson and Michelle Mackey donated drawing gifts and managed the Product Table. Approximately, \$500 was raised for AVVA CA.

"The soldiers are dying. But, even more tragic...the children they have left behind are suffering. Since 1991, Birth Defect Research for Children has recorded thousands of cases like these reported by Vietnam Veterans in the

National Birth Defect Registry."

"The Birth Defect Registry has been the only organization collecting research data and advocating for veterans who have children with disabilities linked to exposure to Agent Orange or chemicals in the Gulf. The children of Vietnam Veterans have shown consistent increases in learning, attention, and behavioral disorders; all types of skin disorders; problems with tooth development; allergic conditions and asthma, just to name few. Associations between Agent Orange and other dioxin-contaminated herbicides and structural birth defects like spina bifida, oral clefts, heart defects and hypospadias may be just the "tip of the iceberg."

Like many Vietnam Veteran families, my husband Butch has personally experienced birth defects for three of his children. Butch was never able to see

his children grow up. All three of his biological children were deformed and stillborn due to the continuing effects of agent orange. "In a study by Field and Kerr with the Department of Paediatrics at the University of Sydney (Journal of Medical Genetics 1988), the authors reported patterns of malformations among Vietnam veterans' children involving the central nervous system, skeletal and cardiovascular systems."

§ 8 3 Revised: 04-21-2022 F. PROJECT FRIENDSHIP 1. Each year, when AVVA meets, either for its National Convention or Leadership Conference, members come together to assist another non-profit organization. 2. It is common for Project Friendship to benefit a charity in the local area of the meeting, or as geographically close as can be located, that works either with Veterans, homeless Veterans, wounded Veterans, or those who have lost a loved one in service to America. 3. AVVA feels it is essential that, as a non-profit organization, we reach out to help other organizations whose mission touches on the Mission and Purpose of AVVA. 4. Project Friendship is announced annually and is the choice of the National President with the approval of the National Board.

AVVA Convention members meet in Orlando, Florida in August 2023. Hence, by choice of the National President and the approval of the National Board, 'National Birth Defect Registry' is a 501c3 non-profit organization that collects research data and advocates for veterans who have children with disabilities linked to exposure to Agent Orange or chemicals in the Gulf.
